TSMS Character Education: Character Trait of the Month- RESPECT



RESPECT

Treat others with respect; follow the Golden Rule • Be tolerant and accepting of differences • Use good manners, not bad language • Be considerate of the feelings of others • Don't threaten, hit or hurt anyone • Deal peacefully with anger, insults, and disagreements

Examples of what RESPECT looks like:

Admitting Mistakes

The ability to examine conduct and actions and see errors and mistakes is a respectful way to act. The process of admitting a mistake and apologizing for it demonstrates a contriteness and repentance, and shows respect for others' feelings. **Mistakes happen but that the important thing is to admit the mistake, apologize and move on.**

Courtesies

Using common courtesies in communicating, **such as "Thank you," "Please" and "Excuse me" in conversations, it shows polite respect.** Sharing and working cooperatively with others is another way to demonstrate respect.

Privacy

Respect the privacy of others. Privacy includes the property of others as well as information pertaining to others. **Children should not invade other people's belongings, or other personal spaces. Respecting privacy is a respect for personal boundaries.**

Empathy

An example of an empathetic response from a child might be a girl noticing another girl watching children playing on the swings on the playground. After swinging for a few moments, the first girl hops down from the swing and invites the other girl to take a turn. The first child **recognized sadness and yearning for a turn and felt motivated to demonstrate care for the other child by sharing.**

Readin' Cheetahs







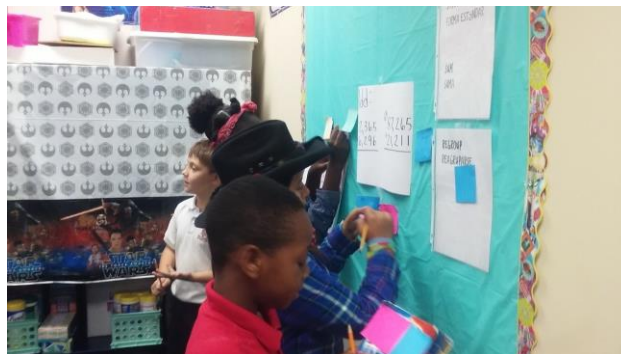

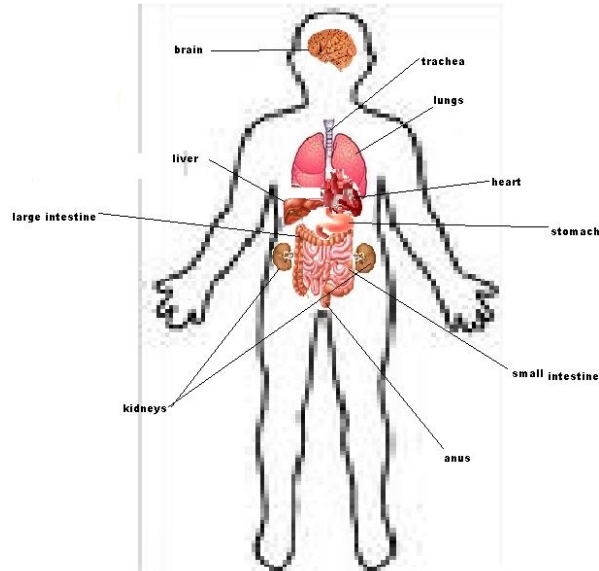
Nature Boosts Brain Power!

TSMS Winter Wear



It will soon be getting colder, students will want to bundle up when coming to school. Parents make sure to stop at All Uniform Wear to pick up the TSMS winter wear. These items are Uniform appropriate and may be worn throughout the school day.

As a reminder the dress code policy is as follows:

- Sweatshirts must be navy blue and the **school logo is required**. The sweatshirt is an economical alternative when students need to have additional warmth. When wearing a sweatshirt, the student must still be wearing another TSMS shirt underneath the sweatshirt – the sweatshirt cannot be worn alone. Sweatshirt may not be worn (tied) around the waist.
- Long sleeve thermals layered under short sleeve Uniform tops are not permitted.
- Boots, Uggs, and high-heeled shoes are not permitted
- Socks, stockings, tights or hose may only be in solid school colors. Clear or skin-colored hose are also acceptable. Fishnet or other patterned stockings or hose are not permitted. Stockings, tights, or hose must cover the full length of the student's legs and feet – leg warmers are not permitted.

- All outside coats and jackets or hooded apparel may not be worn inside the school building

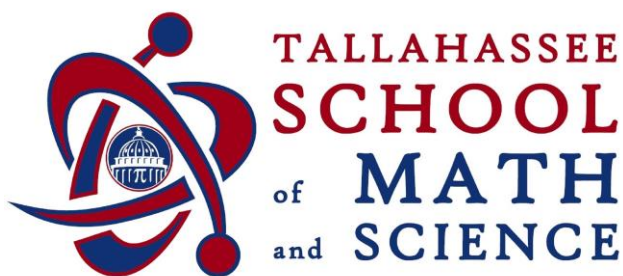
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
